CALL TO ORDER:

Mayor Tim Sievers called the Shoreline Master Plan Revision Public Hearing to order at 7:00 pm.

ROLL CALL:

Deputy Clerk Kelsey Blair took Roll Call.

Councilmembers present: Sarah Bofenkamp, Leslie Sena, Samuel Brink, Travis Deerkop, Robert Brooks, and Ann Barrington

Councilmembers absent: Bill Slinkard

 Councilmember Brooks introduced a MOTION to excuse Councilmember Slinkard's absence from the meeting, the MOTION was seconded by Councilmember Brink. All council members approved, and the MOTION passed.

City staff present: City Administrator (CA) Misty La Follett, Public Works (PW) Superintendent (Supt) Mike Wolf, Police Officer Joel Anderson, and Deputy Clerk (DC) Kelsey Blair

Shoreline Master Program Revision Public Hearing:

Mike Manning, Planner with SCJ Alliance, presented the updated Shoreline Master Program. There are not many changes from the previous Shoreline Master Program. Many of the revisions have to do with the terminology and are based on guidance from the Department of Ecology. The Shoreline Master Program is on a 7 to 8-year review cycle, that complies with the State requirements, and the plan is approved by the Department of Ecology. There was discussion about how residential shoreline is determined. Mr. Manning explained that there were no changes to the properties and the shoreline category that they fall into. Mr. Manning gave the city a large color "Official Shoreline Map" that is available for viewing at City Hall.

Ordinance 1019 - 2023 Shoreline Master Program Periodic Review

- Mayor Sievers read the entire ordinance aloud.
- Councilmember Barrington introduced a MOTION to pass Ordinance 1019 2023 Shoreline Master Program
 Periodic Review, the MOTION was seconded by Councilmember Sena. All council members approved, and the
 MOTION passed.

Mayor Tim Sievers called the regular Council Meeting to order at 7:16 pm.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

 Councilmember Bofenkamp introduced a MOTION to approve the minutes from the regular council meeting on May 23, 2023, the MOTION was seconded by Councilmember Deerkop. All council members approved, and the MOTION passed.

PUBLIC WORKS REPORT:

Supt Mike Wolf presented his report to the Council

Pool-

- The Pool opened Monday, June 12, 2023.
- There is a 6" drain pipe in the pit that is leaking. It has a patch on it and it should hold for the season.

Water:

• Consumption is going up. Expect to see it between 9-11 million gallons in the summer months versus 2 ½-3 million in the winter months.

Sewer:

• SJ Environmental is here every Monday. This is going well

Roach Construction vacuumed 3 lift stations.

Cemetery:

 All the Memorial Day flowers have been cleaned up, thanks to help from Bev and Monte Nearing and the office staff.

Water Main Project

• JR Massie finished up the warranty work last week

POLICE REPORT:

Officer Anderson presented his report to the Council.

32 calls for service and 3 callouts

66 traffic stops, 2 infractions, and 3 criminal citations.

- Responded to a domestic violence call, where a no-contact order was violated. Officer Anderson pursued the man and caught up with him on Cove Road. The man was arrested.
- Infraction issued for the illegal exhaust system on a vehicle.
- Assisted a distraught woman at the gas station who was out of gas and had no money. CA LaFollett approved purchasing a ½ tank of gas for the woman to get to Spokane.
- Contacted the owner of a car that was parked on the corner of Main & Bridge with a for sale sign. That is a code violation. The owner moved the car.
- Infraction issued for expired tabs and no insurance. Criminal citation for failure to transfer title within 45 days.
- Issued a first offense violation, after two verbal warnings, for more than 3 dogs living at a residents.
- Citation issued for reckless driving, after a pickup peeled out at Bridge & Main and at the gas pumps.
- FedEx driver was bitten by a dog. The dog is licensed and has current shots. Owners paid the driver's doctor bill. The dog is now defined as "potentially dangerous."
- Criminal citation issued for driving on a suspended license.
- A suspicious behavior report was filed on two men at Hayton-Green Park while the Elementary students were there on a class trip. Officer Anderson interviewed the men and informed Principal Jones.
- Citizens of Palouse can let Officer Anderson know if they are going to be out of town, for extra patrols around their house
- New PD vehicle is now registered.

CITY ADMINISTRATOR / DEPUTY CLERK REPORT:

Verizon

• Verizon has submitted a proposal asking for a lease of city ground for a Verizon tower. CA LaFollett submitted the emails from Verizon and the response from the city attorney Eric Hansen. Council would like to table this topic until the next meeting, to give them time to do some research.

Community Economic Revitalization Board (CERB) Grant Update

• CA LaFollett reported that the application for grant money to fund a feasibility study for the St. Elmo has been submitted. The next step is a presentation to the CERB board.

City Hall Building

• The AC unit is failing. It is a 16-year-old unit, with the kind of refrigerant that is harder to get and more expensive. Hemphill's Heating and Cooling has submitted 3 quotes for 3 different types of replacement systems.

Pool

- Fully staffed with lifequards.
- Swim lesson sign-ups have opened.

Well Rebuild

• The rebuild for Well #3 is set to start in October and will be budgeted into the 2024 budget. It was last rebuilt in 2005. The cost is approx. \$50,000. Well #1 is scheduled for the 2025 budget year.

OLD BUSINESS:

TD&H - F Street Bridge Water Main Repair

- Mrs. Bly asked for the final payment of invoice voucher #6 of in the amount of \$5754.75.
- Councilmember Sena introduced a MOTION to authorize the mayor to sign the final reimbursement distribution payment; the MOTION was seconded by Councilmember Bofenkamp. All council members approved, and the MOTION passed.
- Mrs. Bly provided a completion report for the project. She explained that Option D is selected which is the lowest interest rate. Mrs. Bly asked the council to approve the mayor signing the completion report.
- Councilmember Barrington introduced a **MOTION** to authorize the mayor to sign the construction project completion report; the **MOTION** was seconded by Councilmember Brooks. All council members approved, and the **MOTION** passed.

Revisions on the Cove Road Sidewalk

- Mrs. Bly informed the council that she and Mr. Utzman attended the Transportation Improvement Board (TIB) grant workshop and reminded the council that the City of Palouse is not eligible to apply for grants until the Cove Road sidewalk is fixed to the standards that it was supposed to be built to. There is a small possibility that a Public Works Board loan might be possible. Mrs. Bly explained that Public Works Board grants and loans are generally for water and sewer, whereas roads and sidewalks are TIB. Mr. Utzman explained that to fix the problem, there needs to be a curb and a gutter to the corner. It needs at least 3 catch basins and a pipe to move the stormwater away. It also needs a block wall to prevent sluffing. Councilmember Brooks asked if the storm gutter might fall under the public work board. Mrs. Bly will explore that possibility.
- Topic is tabled until the next meeting.

NEW BUSINESS:

911 Abuse Ordinance.

 Joe Handley, EMS Coordinator had an emergency and was unable to make his proposal for a 911 Abuse Ordinance. The topic is table until further notice.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Policy & Administration - Chair Barrington:

• At the last meeting Chair Barrington shared a response from the Municipal Research and Service Center of WA (MRSC) regarding the question she had asked about the relationship should be between the Planning Commission and the City Council. Chair Barrington asked the council if they had a chance to review it and if anyone had any thoughts. Chair Barrington explained that direction for the planning commission does not necessarily come from the council and that the planning commission is independent of the council, but can request direction if desired.

Budget, Finance, & Major Acquisitions - Chair Bofenkamp:

• The AC unit was previously budgeted to come from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, but since the AC unit seemed fixed that money was re-budgeted.

OPEN FORUM:

- Kayla Johnston along with her husband Al Pancoast addressed the council about the classification of dogs being "Potentially Dangerous" and "Dangerous." Mrs. Johnston proposes that the ordinance be amended to have a separate repercussion for "potentially dangerous dogs" that is more in line with a strike system, like the repercussions that are used for "public nuisance dog" in PMC 6.08.081.
- Jerry Blair addressed the council on the topic of using the intersection of Main and J Street (between Bagott Motors and the Brewery) as a turnaround. Mr. Blair feels that he was wrongly told by Officer Anderson that he could not turn around there. Mr. Blair made the point that he, and many people in town, use that as a turnaround to avoid illegally crossing the double yellow to park in the angle parking at the post office. Mr. Blair also addressed the excessively long 25 mph speed zones on the Potlatch and Pullman highways. It is a speed trap and it kills the town having speed traps like that.
- Angie Griner asked the council for clarification about the CERB grant. She wanted to know if city money was going to be used on the matching funds if the grant is awarded. Mayor Sievers said the city does not have to take the grant money if the matching funds cannot be raised from external sources, but it has not been discussed as to what the city will do if the matching funds cannot be raised from external sources. Mrs. Griner also addressed the U-turn and crossing the double yellow line. Mrs. Griner made a complaint about witnessing the Garfield Officer backing out of an angled parking spot across the lane of traffic and across the double yellow line, which is illegal. Mrs. Griner also informed the council that Officer Anderson and Garfield Officer Handley were parked in the middle of Beach Street talking to each other. They signaled for her to illegally go around them, but she waited over a minute and a half for them to move. Mrs. Griner informed the council that as she was coming out of the vet clinic, she witnessed Officer Anderson pass a car on Main Street without lights or a siren on. She said it was dangerous. there were oncoming cars and many cars parked along Main Street. She was coming out of the vet clinic. By the time she got in her car and pulled away from the vet clinic, Officer Anderson's emergency was over had he was heading back in the other direction at a normal speed. Mrs. Griner also informed the council that Officer Anderson had ran her license plate while her vehicle was parked on Main. She does not think that Officer Anderson should be just running plates to find out who is parked downtown, whether they are at the Legion Hall, the Caboose, the Brewery, etc. She wants to know why the police are randomly running plates for no reason on cars legally parked on the street.
- Jerry Neumann addressed the council and read "PMC 10.24.040 U-Turns Where Permitted" to the council. Mr. Neumann commented on the dog issue, saying that dog bites on private property are a civil issue and the officer should report to the Department of Health for investigation. Mr. Neumann commented that Officer Anderson should not be parking in the handicapped parking at the post office in the patrol car and Mr. Neumann would like to see more community policing.
- Lesa Neumann reported an incident where she was driving north on Bridge Street, just crossed the bridge and stopped for a pedestrian in the crosswalk, and then continued north past Main St. Officer Anderson came up behind, driving fast without lights or sirens on and passed Mrs. Neumann in the other lane and then kept going. Mrs. Neumann also let the council know that she agrees that there should be neighborhood patrols and that coworkers in Pullman have told her that they do not go to Palouse anymore because it is a speed trap.
- Mrs. Neumann also asked what has changed, because in the last 2-3 years there was hardly anyone pulled over and now it is 65-85 stops. She asked what has happened that has caused these high numbers. Mayor Sievers answered that the community has requested a more visible police presence.

EXECUTIVE SESSION:

There was no executive session.

MAYOR'S REPORT:

- Department of Ecology is coming to the June 27th city council meeting.
- Mayor Sievers and CA LaFollett met with Senator Schoesler. It went well.
- CA Barrington also has a visit scheduled with Congresswoman McMorris Rodgers, as she passes through Palouse.

Councilmember Brooks introduced a **MOTION** to allow the payment of bills; the **MOTION** was seconded by Councilmember Barrington. All council members approved, and the **MOTION** passed.

Public Works Superintendent Council Report

Date: June 08, 2023

(Keep in mind this is 4 days from each council meeting)

POOL:

Shoemaker construction was here last week and replaced the 6" trough drain pipe.

Dustin Kemper came down and put plates on the wall where there we holes from the jack hammer.

Walter patched the floor in the boys locker room where it was jack hammered out.

When we filled the pool up at the end of last week we discovered a leak in a 6" pipe for the deep end. Walter patched it up but we don't know if it will hold until tomorrow when the pool gets filled tonight. Shoemaker Construction said they will be here at the beginning of next week to work on it.

We cleaned and prepped the pool for the last 2 days.

When it gets filled tonight it will have to get filtered twice a day for the next 3 days.

WATER:

The city's water consumption is increasing with the warmer weather. We will be going through a lot more chlorine through the summer. Typically the months of July, August, September we pump around 10 million gallons vs. 2.5 - 3 million in the winter months.

We have had a couple of low water pressure complaints but we haven't had time to work on those yet.

We have a leak at the county shop that we need to investigate yet.

We have received our smart meters.

SEWER:

Sam from SJ Environmental is coming every Monday and says the plant is looking good.

Roach Construction came with their vac trucked and sucked all three lift station sumps at the beginning of the week.

CEMETERY:

The Cemetery looked fantastic this year for one person preparing it for Memorial Day. If you see Evan tell him how good he did and thank him for his hard work and dedication to the cemetery.

Evan, Misty, Kelsey, and the Nearing's picked up flowers on Monday. Evan hauled them to the landfill on Tuesday morning.

PARKS:

Evan had to replace a sprinkler that has been a problem since last summer because it gets drove over. The park on that side is a little dry as he is putting a lot of water to it to green it up.

STREETS:

We swept streets last Friday for the car show downtown.

RV PARK:

We received some low water pressure complaints at the beginning of the week and Walter and I went down and investigated and found nothing wrong with the pressure.

WCI:

Jared and Wes with JR Massie came here and finished up there warranty work last week.

OTHER:

Ella Cuellar will start as our fulltime summer help this Monday.

Palouse Police Department report for Palouse City Council June 13, 2023:

32 calls for service and two call outs since last council.

66 traffic stops resulting in two infractions and three criminal cites issued.

230519-01 — While off duty and on call I received a text from a citizen on the south hill advising her exboyfriend had sent over 200 texts in a twelve hour period in violation of a Domestic Violence No Contact Order she has filed against him. I responded and took a victim statement from her as well as gathered the text threads for evidence. About two minutes after leaving the residence she text "He is here. Please come back." I was able to return to the location in less than thirty seconds to discover he had already attempted entry into her shed, threw a milkshake at her car, ripped off his shirt and screamed "Call the Police!" before fleeing towards Moscow. I was able to locate him on Palouse Cove RD, arrest and book him into Whitman County Jail for the criminal violations. I took another victim statement from the neighbor and the victim, completed the report/investigation and forwarded to prosecutor's office. Felony Stalking charges now pending.

230520-01 — While off duty and on call I received a call from Whitcom advising of suspicious activity at Hayton Park in which a female and male with a dog were in the bathrooms for upwards of a half hour while the vehicle they were associated with was parked in a handicap spot with no disabled placard/plate. I put on my uniform and responded. I located the subjects in the park. Determined nothing criminal occurred but attempted to write handicap parking violation. Discovered the RCW needs to be entered into SECTOR for Palouse PD. Petitioning the court for this to occur.

230522-01 – Since February 2023 I have received multiple complaints in regards to a vehicle with an illegal exhaust system making extreme noise while driving on Main Street. Observed the vehicle being driven and discovered the vehicle has a straight pipe exhaust and therefore no muffler in violation of state law. Took statements from three witnesses and issued infraction.

230522-05 – Responded to RV Park after female called City Hall crying and asking for help. I arrived and discovered the female had no access to her paycheck after her employer had deposited it into an account inaccessible from her phone by mistake. She showed me her gas tank was below the empty line and she had to get to Spokane Valley to get her kids. I consulted with CA Misty and made the call to use the city gas card to give the female half a tank of gas. Female was grateful for the city's generosity and called City Hall to express her gratitude.

230523-02 – While on patrol I observed a vehicle parked at the corner of Main and Bridge with a large FOR SALE sign on the front windshield and driver side window. This is a violation of Palouse Municipal Code 10.32.170 prohibiting parking vehicles on the public roadway for sale. I located a phone number for the registered owner and asked them to move it. They complied within minutes.

230525-01 – I have been working with a residence for months that has had multiple junk vehicles on the property for years. I have removed two vehicles per their request and they have removed three vehicles on their own. Multiple citizens have commented on how much better the property looks.

230525-02 – Accompanied Community Action Center Manager to give a trespass notice that gave an unauthorized tenant ten days to leave the property. I have received harassment complaints from three

different female tenants in which the male is pounding on doors and yelling for them to answer and speak with him. I was sent pictures of this as proof. After ten days the male requested a five day extension and it was granted. Follow up needed come 6-11-23.

230525-04 – While on pro-active patrol I conducted a traffic stop on a vehicle with expired tabs of over one year. Contacted the driver and learned he had no vehicle insurance and had failed to transfer the title within 45 days to his name as he bought it over a year ago. Further investigation revealed this subject had just gotten out of Whitman County jail for Indecent Exposure/Voyeurism charges due to an incident near sororities on the WSU campus. Infractions issued for expired tabs over 2 months, no vehicle insurance and criminal cite for Failure to Transfer Title within 45 Days.

230528-01 — While on patrol I observed an elderly male in an older truck pulled over on the side of the road by Jacob Demand Way and Main. I asked if he needed assistance. He advised he was waiting for a phone call to get directions to a Palouse resident residence to look at a pickup for sale. I advised I knew the name he said and called them. The resident requested I escort him to their house as it was in unincorporated Palouse and is difficult to find via GPS. Led the male to the property and cleared.

230530-01 — Issued dog ordinance first offense violation to resident after receiving video evidence from another citizen showing more than three dogs were living at the residence. This comes after two verbal warnings in which one of the warnings also had video evidence of violation of PMC dog ordinance 6.08.

230530-02 — Citizen contacted me while on patrol requesting to turn in ammunition he discovered while cleaning out a recently deceased relatives house in Palouse. I took custody of a small amount of .357 caliber ammunition and placed it into evidence locker for future destruction.

230531-01 — While on patrol I was contacted by a citizen advising he had witnessed a pickup peel out at the intersection of Bridge and Main. The citizen then witnessed the same subject peel out/burn out in the gravel portion of the gas pumps. Another witness parked behind the pickup witnessed the driving as well as the peel out sent gravel rocks towards his vehicle. I observed an approximately thirteen foot long burnout mark in the gravel about one inch deep. The driver and pickup were positively identified by the witness. I conducted an interview of the driver who stated the witness had confronted him at the gas station which made him angrily peel out in the gravel. Witness provided a written statement under penalty of perjury. Driver was cited for reckless driving and released. ***

230601-01 — Contacted by employee of local vet clinic advising she had found a dog loose on the SR27 near the car wash the night before and took it home to make sure it was safe. Employee advised the dog does not have a chip that lists its owner. I took custody of the dog and transported to Pullman Humane Society for impound as I was unfamiliar with the dog as well. Upon arrival at Humane Society it was discovered the owner had been in contact with them and was in route to take the dog home.

230601-03 — While on patrol I was advised a Fedex driver was bitten while delivering a package on the north hill. The driver advised the incident occurred five hours earlier but he had to finish his route. Driver stated he drove off after the bite and chose not to make contact with dog owner. Driver sent me a picture of the bite area. I made contact with dog owner. I gave dog owner copy of the Palouse Municipal Code in regards to dog now being defined as "potentially dangerous dog" per PMC 6.08.011. Dog is licensed with city and owner showed proof of current shots. Owner cooperative and paid for

driver's doctor bill after he had sought medical attention that night. Follow up needed to determine status of dog in the city.

230605-02 — While working pro-active traffic enforcement. I stopped a vehicle with expired Idaho Plates. A DOL/NCIC check of driver revealed he had a suspended driving status out of Indiana, a NO BAIL felony probation violation warrant from a DV Assault out of Indiana (non-extraditable), no vehicle insurance, and alcohol on his breath. Further investigation revealed he was below the threshold for a DUI and did not meet the driving requirements for a Negligent 1st Degree arrest. I arrested the driver for DWLS and impounded his vehicle. Criminal citation issued for DWLS.

230608-01 — While off duty and on call, I received a phone call from a Garpal Elementary School teacher advising two fifth grade male students reported suspicious behavior/interaction with two adult men at Hayton Park during a class outing to the park. The teacher gave a complete make/model and plate of the vehicle. As I arrived I was advised the vehicle had left the park last seen headed towards town. I located the vehicle at the school as the two males were contracted to work on some maintenance issues at the school. I interviewed both males. Both agreed they were parked in the west parking lot when two boys initiated contact by complimenting their car. The driver advised the boys were digging at the bottom of a tree so he said watch out for bee hives. The two men said that is where the interaction ended. Both boys agree to the above version of events but added it appeared the driver used his finger as if to say "come here." The boys walked away and reported the interaction. I contacted GarPal High School Principal and advised of the incident. Report taken.

Vacation house checks — Any citizen wanting extra patrols/house checks while away on vacation need simply to text my cell number with name/cell number/dates they will be gone. I will check the property and ensure doors/windows are locked/secure.

The new patrol vehicle is now registered with DOL and has the former Durango plates affixed it to it.

Lastly, while I always appreciate the community being my eyes and ears, please remember to just be a "GOOD WITNESS" when observing possible criminal or suspicious activity. Do not take it upon yourself to confront or put hands on someone. Call/text my cell or 911 with a good description of what they are wearing, make/model/plate of vehicle they are associated with, and where they were last seen. I will attempt to locate, make contact and investigate the circumstances.
